MIA BERARDUCCI WINS 'HAMILTON WAY' AWARD

Award recognizes a graduate who exemplifies integrity, compassion, selflessness, and perseverance in the face of difficulty.

Mia Berarducci hasn't had an easy journey throughout her high school career at Hamilton High School. In fact, she's battled her entire life. When she was just one-year-old, Mia was diagnosed with both cancer and OMAS (neurological condition attacking her cerebellum). In the following years, that was compounded by battling epilepsy and other medical challenges until she was eight. Unfortunately, last year, more medical problems arose and made her senior year a difficult one to navigate. Simply put, Mia brings the word 'perseverance' to a whole new level. Her fighting spirit and positive attitude through all of the adversity made her a perfect choice for the 2023 Hamilton Way Award.





Since March 2022, I've been dealing with a medical issue that is very complicated and a mystery to the doctors at Helen DeVos Children's Hospital," Mia explained. "Through all this, I try to take things one step at a time because I feel overwhelmed a lot."

With so much excitement going into her senior year, Mia admits it hasn't been the experience she had hoped as she was in and out of the classroom and hospital. However, she remained committed to her school work and is now a Hamilton High School graduate.

"I kept saying, 'This isn't what I was expecting my senior year to be like," Mia explained, "I was always in and out of the hospital and it was painful and exhausting. Somehow, I got my school stuff done. My teachers are very helpful and understanding and I really appreciate that about them."

This summer will be a busy one for the Berarducci family as Mia gets set to undergo testing at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio this summer. Her family is hopeful that she can get medically cleared to attend Hope College's Ready for Life Program this fall.

"From day one of kindergarten on, people have come around her and they've enjoyed working with her," said Mia's mother, Amy Berarducci, "They've loved her and she's loved them. Seeing her graduate is bittersweet because Hamilton has been a great place for her and for us, but we are excited for her future."

2023 BOND PROPOSAL PASSES



The 2023 Hamilton School Bond Proposal passed on Tuesday, May 2 to help fund improvements to safety and security, facility infrastructure, and learning environments.

Improvement projects include:

- Deconstruction of the 1952 wing at Hamilton Elementary
- 8-classroom addition at Hamilton Elementary, including Special Education and STEM
- Roofing
- Electrical, plumbing, and mechanical system upgrades, as needed
- Restroom upgrades as needed
- Community pool dehumidification system
- Security film at all school entrances
- Playground equipment upgrades and extended fencing as needed
- Physical education classroom redesign at Hamilton High School
- Fire Alarms
- Classroom casework, doors, lighting, finishes, flooring, locker, ceiling improvements as needed
- Educational classroom technology upgrades
- Replacement of aging school buses

HAMILTON HIGH SCHOOL HOSTS 57TH DISTRICT COURT THROUGH 'COURT IN SCHOOL' PROGRAM

On Thursday, April 13, Hamilton High School became the 57th District Court. It was the first time Hamilton has hosted the 'Court in School' program since 2011 and the first time the 57th District Court visited an Allegan County school since 2018.


"We request an order from the Michigan Supreme Court that designates Hamilton High School for an actual courtroom for today's court and proceedings," said Honorable William A. Baillargeon. "We do this in order to give students an opportunity to see courtroom incidents in action."

The students get to see live participants who are defendants with real sentencing and consequences. Following court, the students see a presentation from the court and learn about consequences of their actions.

"I think it's incredibly valuable for our tenth and twelfth grade students to go through this experience," said Hamilton High School principal, Mitch Bosch. "With our tenth graders going into driving soon and seniors to go through prom, graduation, and the next steps of life, it's important to see the real world consequences for their decisions."

On top of the court proceedings, students were able to learn about the careers of a judge, attorney, police officer, and different roles within the courthouse.

Hamilton eighth grader Charlee Hoover has flourished in Hamilton in just eight short months.

"I expected a peer to peer program, and we have gotten so much more," said Charlee's mother, Stacy.

Her parents enrolled her into Hamilton Middle School from out of district in September. Since then, she has not only fit in, she has excelled.

She's so much more included here," added Stacy, "She's accepted here.

Charlee is diagnosed with an intellectual disability and is a part of Mrs. Taylor Sale's daily living skills class at HMS, where she has quickly blossomed into a leader.

"Charlee is somebody in our Life Skills program that stands out," said Ken Lentz, Dean of Students at Hamilton Middle School. "She is an exemplifier for other students that maybe feel like they can't do some of these things, but Charlee has proven that anything is possible."

She truly has and isn't afraid to try new things, stepping out of her comfort zone this spring to join the HMS Track & Field team, running the 70-meter dash and throwing shotput.

"When I first met Charlee and she was interested in running track for us, I was all for it," Lentz, who also serves as the HMS Track & Field coach, said.
