Blue Star Elementary 4th grade teacher, Andrew Szczerowski is a favorite of most former students of his. Since 2002, Mr. S has been making an impact within Hamilton Community Schools.

On his 22nd first day in the district, he gave his class a welcoming message that set his expectations for his classroom, both for himself and his students.

"For 185 days, that's how long a school year is, I am yours. I will protect you, I will care about you, I care about your soul, how your family is doing, how much you're learning, how your friendships are going, I care about ALL of that," Mr. S told his class.

• My metaphor is the blizzard/snowflake metaphor. My job is to create a blizzard of lessons and intelligence, all I do during my lessons is throw out a blizzard of ideas and thoughts that you have a chance to either grab and put in your snowball or let it hit the ground and melt. However, you cannot recreate that snowflake, meaning every lesson, every game, every opportunity in here is a chance for you to grab an experience or some bit of intelligence and put it in your snowball. It is my job to create the snow storm and blizzard, it's your job to grab the snowflakes and take advantage of it. You're not going to grab every one, some days you'll be grumpy, or you'll have a bad day, but you don't want to walk out of this room with wet feet every day. Wet feet are from the opportunities you lost because the snow melted."

### BENTHEIM ELEMENTARY ECSE TEACHER LAURA MODRESKE WINS 'ONE SCHOOL AT A TIME' GRANT

Laura Modreske has been in education for 37 years, the last six coming in Hamilton. Since her arrival, she has captured the hearts of so many young Hawkeyes in her Early Childhood Special Education program at Bentheim Elementary. On August 25, Modreske was rewarded for all of her hard work by winning the 'One School at a Time' \$1,000 grant from Family Fare, Spartan Nash, and WOODTV.

As you may remember, Mr. Bill Mousel won the first-ever award in June, so Modreske is the second Hawkeye in the first three months of the grant's history to be awarded it!

The grants are awarded based on the creativity, community impact, school impact, and execution of the school's grant proposal. As for her plans for the \$1,000, Modreske is going to put it to good use for her young Hawkeyes.

"This money is our starting point to develop our preschool playground,

because all of our playground equipment here is designed for children five and up, and my children can't use it."

"I want them to be able to get out and explore nature a little bit more, be on the grass, climb, build, and do things they can't do in the setting we have now."

Bentheim Elementary principal Jared Randall accompanied Laura to accept the check and also took the time to explain what her presence means around the building.

"First and foremost, Laura is a fantastic human being," Randall smiled, "She's a unique blend of a farmer's work ethic and a person who has a deep, innate, passionate love for kids, especially kids who have unique needs. She really sets them up for success, no matter where they go after her classroom."

While bond dollars will soon be hard at work revamping the Bentheim Elementary playground, the grant money will certainly help get a jump start on her preschool playground equipment as well. Congratulations to Laura, and thank you for all of your hard work!

Hamilton Middle School teacher Bill Mousel certainly knows how to capture his student's attention, even at the toughest times. In the beginning of the school year, when most teachers and students are still getting acclimated, Mr. Mousel is already getting his Hamilton Middle Schoolers focused.

On August 24 and 25, Mousel hosted his annual 'Jumanji Math' challenge for his students. Jumanji Math is, of course, based off of the game Jumanji and provides a fun and engaging way for his students to settle back in to the new school year while work on math and problem solving skills.

"We're starting our math year off with this because I want these kids to come in solving problems and feeling successful," Mousel explained. "I want them to think of math more than just calculating numbers that we'll never use again, I want them to have a great experience at the beginning of the year."



The students were put into random groups and competed against one another, including at a challenge table. It's a way for students to get back into working in a team with classmates and get themselves ready to solve problems all year long.

#### I think this is a great starter, I hate to say everybody is on it but we have a huge majority of kids that are really motivated by this."

### 'HAWKEYE KIDS' BEFORE & AFTER SCHOOL CHILDCARE PROGRAM HAS A GREAT START TO 2023-24 By: Andrea Kuzee & Morgan Koops

At the start of this school year, Hawkeye Kids kicked off the district's first ever before and after school program. With three locations (Hamilton Elementary, Bentheim, and Blue Star) Hawkeye Kids provides before and after care to elementary families across the district. Childcare is also provided on snow days, half days, days off school, and over the summer. Building an entire program from the ground up is no easy task, but with Morgan Koops as their coordinator, Hawkeye Kids took flight. From logistics to licensing, Morgan and her team were able to welcome kids into their before and after school program on the first day of school, August 23, 2023.

With over 50 families currently enrolled, Hawkeye Kids has quickly become a big hit. A parent with a child currently enrolled at Hawkeye Kids Bentheim location states: "My daughter loves going to Hawkeye Kids, she talks about how much fun she has with her friends, Miss. Mary and Miss. Cheyenne. Not only does she love to go, I love the flexibility it gives my family. No more crazy rush from work to school to pick her up at the end of the day, I get so much comfort from knowing that she is taken care of until I get there." Other parents have noted that they were able to add 10 hours to their work week, because they no longer have to leave early to beat the bus. Mary Buus, site supervisor at Bentheim, noted that parents have also talked about how they love having a program in place that provides consistency for children who no longer need to be shuffled between babysitters and grandparents before or after school.



The teams of site supervisors and support staff at each of Hawkeye Kid's 3 locations work daily to provide fun, educational experiences for the children in their care. Heather Curtis, site supervisor at Hamilton Elementary, talked recently about a new activity that has become popular with kids, support staff, and supervisors. "A tradition we have started at Hamilton Elementary is cricket hunting. It started with one child's interest in finding a cricket chirping in a hallway. It has grown to include most of our AM crew... We are so lucky to have kids that are interested in learning and going on adventures with us! We can not wait to watch the program grow and meet more students who will bring in new ideas and inspiration to our group!". Laura Bruursema, site supervisor at Hamilton Elementary, excitedly explained that a student at their site had taken in origami paper from home, where she had been practicing. "She taught a group of fellow Hawkeye Kids to make origami paper hearts and paper bunnies! We all had a great time passing the hearts out to those we were thinking of!"

Hawkeye Kids has been a wonderful addition to the district. Christine Martin, Curriculum Specialist and Site Supervisor states "Hawkeye Kids is off to a great start! It has been so rewarding to see students interact with others from across the building, all while playing outside, problem solving, and engaging in new activities and games." With just 3 months under their wings, we can't wait to see what heights Hawkeye Kids soars to next. Enrollment for the program is reopening to families in October, be on the lookout for more information!

### HAMILTON ATHLETIC BOOSTERS CONTINUE TO RAISE FUNDS & SUPPORT FOR HAWKEYE ATHLETICS

The Hamilton Athletic Boosters have a long history of providing support for Hawkeye athletics, both at the high school and middle school levels. Lisa Mast is the concessions manager and responsible for finding volunteers to work at various athletic events throughout the school year.

The Athletic boosters is a group of parents that volunteer to support our athletes in middle school and high school, as much as possible to help purchase equipment that may be outside of the traditional budget. The Boosters ask for requests from teams and weigh the needs and benefits of each program and once establishing a budget, the funds are disbursed to cover the approved requests. The Hamilton Athletic Boosters are reliant on two fundraisers every year: their annual February banquet and concessions stands at athletic events.

Once a month, the boosters board comes together to discuss any needs that are set forth by Athletic Director, Eric Talsma and the coaches.

"We strive to achieve paying for as many requests as possible via a partial amount or a full amount," Lisa Mast, concessions manager for the athletic boosters explained, "We just love on our community and our kids."

Despite new faces to the boosters board and volunteers over the past two years, they have found major success in aiding Hawkeye athletics. Mast says they have raised a good amount of funds and have made a true impact around the district.

"We were able to catch up from the COVID pause on new uniforms. We try to keep a rotation every three to four years for every Varsity sports team," Mast added, "We also purchased the new mascot outfit, endzone cameras and headsets for our football team, pitching machines for baseball and softball, and purchased volleyball sling nets for the volleyball teams. We also award scholarships to four senior athletes every year.

That may seem like a lot, but that's not all. The Boosters have also purchased new basketball net attachments for Little Hawks Basketball and provided a stipend to the elementary physical education teachers to purchase new equipment at all four elementary schools. Still, they have their sights set on more!

"We are working on new scoreboards for both the soccer and football stadiums to update with new LED lights to make it brighter and easier to read during our earlier games," said Mast.

# THINGS TO KNOW FROM SRO JOE

With the beginning of the school year upon us, we have made several upgrades to both district and classroom safety and security. District wide training started in August and will continue through November for teachers and other staff members who are in our buildings on a daily basis on what to do in the case of an emergency. The training is not just for an active assailant, but for any type of emergency that may arise; weather related, fire, and/or an active assailant or suspicious person on school grounds. Teachers were given an overview Powerpoint on the Welcome Back to school day in August, dealing with active assailants and what to do in case such an event occurs in our community. As a reminder, if a school goes into lockdown it does not do so only for an active assailant situation. Rather, it can be for exterior situations such as law enforcement handling a situation going on near or around our buildings throughout the district. Our goal is to be PREPARED, NOT PARANOID for emergency situations that may arise in our district.

The building staff have and will be learning what to do in case of a lockdown in our schools for an active assailant in our building. The training deals with how to secure and fortify our classroom doors, how to get out of the classroom in an emergency when the door can not be used, and much more. These are skills which are not only for school, but skills which can be used in our daily lives at a mall, movie theater, or grocery store.

In addition to the security of the classroom, GO BUCKETS have been placed in every classroom and common areas of our school buildings. These buckets serve as a multi-purpose item and can be used in a number of different situations/emergencies that may arise while the kids of our district are under our watch. Along with this training and equipment, we have been hard at work reviewing and updating our district's EOP (Emergency Operations Plan), along with updates to EMG (Emergency Management Guides) for handling building level emergencies, and our new EPG (Emergency Response Guides) for the classroom level emergencies. These plans and guides have been under review and updated since the Spring of 2023, which were given out at the start of the school year. While we hope these items are ever needed, we do need to be prepared in the case of an emergency. Please know the safety of the students and staff in our school district and community are of the highest priority and we continue to improve and update our safety procedures consistently.

#### **PUTTING AN OUT-OF-COMMISSION SCHOOL BUS TO GOOD USE**

"The bus is an old, retired bus that we had here at Transportation so I was asked if there's anything we could ever do anything with it and we came up with this training," said SRO Deputy Joe Knapp. "The fire department said it was an awesome experience and they gained knowledge on what they can and can't do to get someone out of the bus."

It's an important partnership that is a win-win for all parties involved.

"It was an awesome opportunity, thanks to Hamilton Schools for letting us do this. We talked about stabilization tactics, extrication techniques, we opened the bus from the roof side to get people out in a quick manner," said Mike Capel, assistant fire chief at Hamilton Fire Rescue.

Overisel Township, Salem Township, and Graafschap Township Fire Departments all came out later that week to get some training in as well. WZZM 13 also covered the event!

## RETURN OF HHS SPANISH EXCHANGE PROGRAM PROVES TO BE A WIN-WIN FOR ALL STUDENTS

For over 40 years, the Hamilton community has welcomed students from a variety of countries via our exchange programs offered at the high school. Because of the hard work of teachers past, we were previously able to build connections with high schools in England, Germany, and Spain. This year, we have begun building a new relationship with a school in Granada, Spain, called Colegio Monaita. This fall 23 Hamilton High School students in either Spanish 4 or AP Spanish 5 classes, along with their families, each welcomed a different student from Monaita into their homes.

These 23 students were accompanied by two teachers from Monaita. One of those teachers, Rebecca Ayres, is the sister of Hamilton High School teacher, Mary Ayres. Over the past several years, the two of them have contemplated making this dream a reality, of building an exchange between their two schools. It truly was a dream come true for them both to be able to work together and provide this experience for both of their communities. Together they spent hours matching students with hosts and planning different activities so that the students could see and experience as much of the Hamilton community as possible.

To start their 3 weeks here in the US, the group spent 2 days in Chicago. There, they learned first hand about the city of Chicago by spending time on Navy Pier, floating down the Chicago River on the water taxis, and taking in the views from the SkyDeck atop the WIllis Tower. They also enjoyed a true American diner experience at Ed Debevic's, ate too much Chicago style pizza, and used the time to get to know each other, going on adventures together in the city and making Starbucks runs multiple times daily.

Depending on the day you could find them presenting to the high school and middle school Spanish classes about some of the highlights of their Spanish culture, spending time in the 3rd grade classrooms at Blue Star Elementary, teaching them their numbers in Spanish, kids songs and crafts, and reading them bilingual books, and even becoming cheerleaders for a day, where each student donned a cheer uniform and followed the lead of our own cheerleaders, learning chants and jumps.

Both the Hamilton and Spanish girls spent some time off the HHS campus as well. For a morning, the girls took a walking tour of Hope College, culminating at the DeVos Field House where they got an insider's tour of the locker rooms, training facility and weight room. From there they raced around downtown Holland, participating in a photo scavenger hunt, posing with people in Hope gear, in front of an American flag, with a lighthouse, blueberries, and other staples of life here in West Michigan. To round out the day, the group spent time at Dutch Village, learning about our Dutch heritage and being kids at heart, riding the swings and cuddling the bunnies and chickens.

The groups also spent time zooming through the Lake Michigan dunes when the Saugatuck Dune Rides graciously opened their doors, and trucks to the kids even after their season had ended. The girls were also warmly welcomed at the Outdoor Discovery Center, where they learned about the indigenous cultures of West Michigan, awed at the birds of prey, and where some, but not all, bravely held praying mantis that they found on their hike around the property.

Even Though their 3 weeks here were packed with fun-filled activities, both the Spaniards and Americans would tell you that the best part of this exchange was simply their time spent together doing all American things. The time with family riding in the car, the time spent at cottages, camping, bonfires, football games, or at home watching movies and sharing a meal together. This new bond was more than evident at the Farewell Dinner in the high school cafeteria. Each Spaniard addressed the group, host families included, and gave their heartfelt thanks and shared teary-eyed stories of their favorite experience while here in their homes.

To say the Hamilton students are looking forward to their time in Spain this coming June would be an understatement. While there, they will get to experience the same hospitality that the Hamilton community has shown the Spanish students. They will grow their minds, their experiences, and their bonds that will truly last a lifetime.



### **28 YEARS INTO TEACHING AT HIS ALMA MATER, "OLD DOG" BLAINE LUGTEN CONTINUES TO THRIVE**

Blaine Lugten didn't get the opportunity to teach at Hamilton High School right away out of college. Instead, the 1984 HHS graduate took a job at Fennville High School before the chance presented itself six years later.

#### HAMILTON 5TH GRADE STUDENTS HELP BRAINSTORM FUTURE ELEMENTARY PLAYGROUND RECONSTRUCTION

As part of the 2023 Hamilton Community Schools bond proposal that was passed in May, playground redesign at all four elementary schools will be on the docket! To help get the students involved in the process, our Work Based Learning coordinator Ashley Meyer and administration helped set up elementary playground visits for our 5th grade students.

On Wednesday, September 13, Mrs. Jodi Hansen and Ms. Brooke Statema's students went to Bentheim Elementary and Salem Township Park to brainstorm some ideas of what could be incorporated and created at Bentheim. Meanwhile, Mrs. Garner and Mrs. Miles 5th grade classes went to Blue Star Elementary and Kollen Park to help explore ideas!

"We're so excited and thankful that we passed our 2023 bond and very excited that we have our 5th graders here to give us their ideas," said Bentheim and Sandyview Elementary principal, Jared Randall. "These students will give us ideas for future playground equipment that is fun, safe, and uses taxpayer dollars to the best of our abilities."

The students talked to some of the current elementary students on the playground to see why they were playing on different equipment instead of others. Where the 5th graders would see lines or overused equipment, they would document it as well as what should be moved or removed completely.

"We found out that the kids don't use the open slides but they really like the tube slides," said 5th grader Raina Rietema.

Mrs. Hansen then watched her 5th graders visit the Salem Township Park in Burnips and enjoy the walking trail, something a lot of students documented could be possible at Bentheim with all of the open space.

"We have some ideas, some of our kids already took off to the trail over there and they enjoy that idea, some of them are already saying that we could do something like this at Bentheim," Hansen smiled.

5th grader Peyton Roelofs spent time discussing ideas with elementary students at Bentheim.

"The zipline at Bentheim could be a lot bigger, a lot of the kids said it was too small," she explained. "The students also want a bigger soccer goal and maybe a bigger football or baseball field," Roelofs added.

All of the students took notes during their afternoon field trip and will then split into groups and discuss their ideas. After weeks of working on their projects and creating presentations, the 5th graders will present to a board of HCS administrators who will then take these concepts into consideration for playground construction in the future.
