## RtI Parapro Job Description

- -follow lesson plans as given from the Lit. Coach or the teachers
- -be prepared for your group (copy materials, review lessons, meet with Lit. Coach, etc.)
- -go to the classroom to pick up your group and walk them back afterwards
- -be aware of and follow through with each classroom discipline policy and communicate with teacher when necessary
- -attend benchmark meetings, if required
- -complete the RtI observation form and give to classroom teacher as the need arises
- -on days when RtI does not take place, you are responsible to be working in your "home" classroom or where help is needed.
- -when you are going to be gone, you must have either your lesson plans prepared and ready for one of the other teachers/parapros OR have an "emergency folder" of three to four activities that are ready to use with your group.
- -if possible, sending an email to all parapros, teachers, Lit. Coach and building principal is highly recommended. If an email is not possible, make a call by 8:15 on the morning of your absence to either your building principal or secretary.

## Parapro Chapter Book Activity and Question Guide

**Before Reading:** (Pre-read what you are going to have the students read)\*\*\*\*Vocab. activities described on other Reading Comprehension sheet. \*\*\*Spend LOTS of time on the Before Reading!!!!!

- 1. Before Reading charts attached.
- 2. Read the back of the book and look over the pictures and cover.
- 3. What clues does the title give you about the story?
- 4. Is this a real or imaginary story (non-fiction or fiction)?
- 5. Why are you reading this?
- 6. What predictions can you make?

**During Reading:** While you are reading, only ask questions that will keep the students IN the text--don't spend too long otherwise they will get pulled OUT of the text.

After the chapter is done:

- 1. What do you understand from what you just read?
- 2. What is the main idea of the chapter?
- 3. What picture is the author painting in your head?
- 4. Do you need to reread so that you understand?
- 5. Summarize/Retell the chapter's main ideas.
- 6. Start talking about character (come up with some character traits), setting, plot.

## After Reading:

- \*\*The BEST practice is to have the students write a summary of the book. Do together for the first several books so they know how to do it correctly.
- \*\*Graphic organizers attached--figure out he problem, steps and solution to every chapter book that you read.
- 1. Which of my predictions were right?

- 2. What connections can I make to the text? Text to self, text to text, text to world.
- 3. Why do you think the author chose this particular setting?
- 4. Why do you think the author ended the story in this way?
- 5. Which character is most like you? Most unlike you?
- 6. Have the students take an AR test on the book to check on their comprehension.
