HAMILTON COMMUNITY SCHOOLS HIRES FIRST-EVER SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

For the first time ever, Hamilton Community Schools will have a School Resource Officer (SRO) roaming the hallways of district buildings. On November 7, Superintendent Dr. Bradford Lusk announced the hiring of Allegan County Sheriff's Deputy Joe Knapp as the school's SRO.

Knapp is a 23-year veteran of the police force after serving five years in the United States Air Force from 1989-1994, leaving the service with the rank of Sergeant. As a parent of five Hamilton graduates and assistant high school football coach for six years, Knapp knows the community and district well.

"We are very fortunate to employ not only a decorated deputy, but one that is a resident, parent, and coach in our district," said superintendent, Dr. Bradford Lusk. "Having someone who understands Hamilton will only better serve our students, staff, and stakeholders. The training, relationship building, and community outreach opportunities that Deputy Knapp brings to the position are impressive and makes him the best person for the position."



This move further exemplifies the commitment to school safety for first-year superintendent, Dr. Bradford Lusk after taking over the role in July.

"Having an official School Resource Officer (SRO) in our district provides many benefits to not only our buildings, but also to our community," said superintendent, Dr. Bradford Lusk. "Bridging the gap between community, school district, and law enforcement is important to ensuring a seamless chain of events can occur in the case of an emergency."

Funds for the position were made available by safety grants from the State of Michigan. Knapp will begin his role on December 1 and will be providing safety across the district's six buildings and at various school events. Deputy Knapp will also be involved in the training of staff and students for emergency situations as well as overall district safety layouts and planning.

"After meeting with community members in my first months on the job, adding additional measures of safety and security to our district has been a top priority," said Dr. Lusk. "Planning has been underway for months regarding the safety grants and how to best utilize those funds. Budgeting has already been underway to ensure the long-term sustainability of such an important position."

"MORE THAN JUST A COFFEE"

Daily Living Skills coffee deliveries making an impact at Hamilton Middle School

The staff at Hamilton Middle School doesn't need to worry about making their own coffee or tea in the mornings during the school year. In fact, the Daily Living Skills special education class is making, and delivering, their favorite drinks every morning.

The students receive daily order forms from the staff and they immediately begin getting to work on the specific orders. Some staff may request black coffee, while others want cream and sugar, tea, or hot chocolate and it's all made to their liking. After the drinks are made, the students help put the staff member's name on the cup and onto the correct cart before delivering it to their office or classroom.

"I stepped into this role six years ago and they were already doing a little bit of a coffee delivery service, so we just took that and beefed it up a bit," said Taylor Sale.

The coffee delivery has become a pivotal part of Mrs. Sale's class as it helps her students with critical life skills.

"On top of teaching the functional academics, the kids benefit from practicing communication and social skills. They get to meet more teachers and just become a bigger part of the community here at Hamilton Middle School."

On Tuesday, September 27, Mrs. Kapenga's classes had a very special visitor. Alison Gillum from Gift of Life Michigan visited the Anatomy and Biology classes throughout the day and brought real-life human organs that have been preserved for education through the 'All of Us' program.

"All of Us program is an award-winning program where we bring out fun resources like human organs and tissue samples to teach the students about organ and tissue donation, why people need transplants, and different jobs as well."





Students were not only able to touch and hold the organs but also learned about organ donation, transplants, and surgeries.

"We use these organs as a tool to teach students about their health and show them the kind of damage that vaping or smoking could do to lungs and some other diseases that could potentially affect an organ," added Gillum.

Mrs. Gillum also explained to the students all of the different options they have in the medical field, should they choose to explore that career. Several students throughout the day say they're now interested in that pathway moving forward.

"My biggest takeaway was seeing how all of the organs fit inside of our bodies and it was such a cool experience to get to feel them and hold them," said Hamilton High School junior, Caia Andrews.

After learning about the organs in textbooks, it was a great experience for the students to see them up close.

"It was cool to see all of the different organs because they looked different than they did in pictures. This is really cool because it's so hands on," said fellow junior, Alaina Banks.

Zach Aalderink and Jacob Sharp have always been interested in athletics, dating back to their time as students at Hamilton. Unfortunately, neither of them could ever suit up with their friends and play the sports they loved. However, Hamilton Community Schools staff members were quick to use their passion and turn it into a victory for everyone involved.

After her son Zach was diagnosed with Down Syndrome, Linda Aalderink knew the district that would best serve him and their family.

"We knew we would be sending him to Hamilton right away and it was the best decision we've ever made," she smiled. "He has flourished here, from kindergarten through high school. Hamilton has been a blessing to us as a family, but I know having Zach in the hallways at Hamilton has made an impact on other students as well and it was best for everybody."

Not only did Zach excel in school and socially with other students, but he quickly found an interest while watching his classmates take to the football field on Friday nights.





"He's always liked sports, as he got older in high school he expressed interest in being on the sidelines with the team," added his mother, Linda.

After conversations with different staff members and the football coaches, the rest became history. 22 years later, Zach is still looking forward to every Friday night under the lights.

"It means so much, he's had a sense of belonging and a place where he feels like he's part of the team and making a difference. I believe it has made a difference having his face and enthusiasm down here," she added. "I think it has meant a lot to the team, he's been a constant on the sidelines for 22 seasons."

Joining Zach ten years later in 2010, came Hamilton student Jacob Sharp. Another football fan, Sharp had also expressed interest in wanting to be on the sidelines with the team. After just a few short conversations with Jacob's teachers and the football program, he was running out of the huddle and taking the field with the Hawkeyes.

"We found out when he was born that he had Down Syndrome," said Jacob's mother, Lisa Sharp. "Thankfully, we have a school that embraces those with different abilities and finds a place where they can thrive."

Jacob began to take the field with his seventh grade classmates in 2010 and as they moved up in grades, he would be right there beside them for the football season. When his classmates graduated, Jacob stayed and remained with the varsity program alongside Zach Aalderink to help boost the Hawkeye spirit.

"Some of these men of Friday night football may have a child of their own with a disability," Lisa said. "They can look back and think, 'Oh, I remember Jake Sharp or Zach Aalderink and it's going to be okay,' sometimes we're just planting seeds."

8,493 MILES AWAY FROM HOME, NOPPAWAN "POR" JEARAPONGPAKORN FINDS PEACE IN HAMILTON

Bangkok, Thailand native is one of six Foreign Exchange Students in 2022-23

Over the past year, Noppawan "Por" Jearapongpakorn has been excited to enter the Foreign Exchange program and come to the United States. However, just months before leaving her hometown of Bangkok, Thailand, some doubt crept in.

"Last year I decided to join the program and I was excited but as time changes, people do too," Por explained. "My mind changed like 'I don't want to come here anymore."

It's a drastic change going from a city of over 10-million to a small town 8,493 miles away with less than 4,000 people. Por didn't see any skyscrapers, street food, or temples. As she explains, she couldn't pronounce any American names, just as Americans couldn't pronounce hers. Despite all of the change, she immediately knew it was the right decision to enroll in the program and come to Hamilton.

"When I arrived here this year, I can say it was a good decision," she smiled. "Hamilton High School is one of the best schools, I can tell you that you need to study here and people are so nice. Teachers, counselors, or anyone that walks passed you, they're very nice to talk to you and are very open and respectful."





The Hamilton High School junior is enrolled in high academic courses, including AP Chemistry, Calculus, and others. It's a big change from a city of over 10-million people to a small town of under 4,000, but she is loving every minute of it.

"One thing that makes me feel at home in Hamilton is my host family and all of you guys. You're all family to me and are very respectful to me. Although I'm Asian, you're all respectful and really accept me, I love Hamilton High School," said Por.

WORK BASED LEARNING CONTINUES TO TEACH CAREERS, LIFE LESSONS TO STUDENTS

Hamilton Community Schools is committed to providing students in grades 5-12 with Work Based Learning (WBL) opportunities. Each grade level in grades 5-9 have a high wage, high demand career pathway that they focus on.

Hamilton fifth grade students focus on the career pathway of Construction. This fall, students began this experience with Skills4Success day where they learned about skills necessary in the workplace such as collaboration, communication, and problem solving, from professionals. They also kicked off their Project Based Learning (PBL) project where they will be looking to repurpose the stage space in the east gym of the middle school. Students will pitch their ideas to a panel of professionals in the spring. Meanwhile, fifth grade students are getting ready for DIG IN! Day in December where students will have hands-on experiences in areas of construction such as carpentry, project management, interiors, HVAC, electrical, plumbing, and many others.

Hamilton sixth grade students focus on the career pathway of Business. This fall, students toured a local business to learn more about how their business operates, how Skills4Success are important in the workplace, and how various aspects of the business (such as Human Resources, Marketing, Finance, Sales, Logistics, etc). Students also worked with the Grand Rapids Griffins to learn about their front office operations. In the winter, students will partner with a local business to dig in deeper and solve a question the business is looking to tackle. Sixth grade students offer a fresh perspective to the business, and they learn a lot about how businesses work. We are so thankful for our 6th grade business partners for the 2022/23 school year (K&R Truck Sales, Gentex, Cento Anni, Fabcon, Evoqua Water Technologies, Holland BPW, JR Automation, and the Grand Rapids Griffins).



In seventh grade, students learn about manufacturing. Students have an opportunity to explore the pathway in their Advisory class and in social studies with a PBL project at the end of the year. Recently, students also participated in Manufacturing Week by touring three different local manufacturers (including: Mission Design and Automation, Transmatic, Nelson Steel, Koops Automation Systems, Hyperion Automation, Adient, and BuhlerPrince). Students were able to learn about the importance of skilled trades and the career opportunities they offer. Companies also highlighted careers such as engineering, technical writing, and project management. This spring, students will visit 3 more companies.

Eighth graders concentrate on a career pathway with a lot of local opportunity, Agriscience and Natural Resources Management. While students have the opportunity to explore this pathway in their Advisory class, students also learn about this pathway in the context of their STREAM class with PBL projects, expert panels, and presentations to local experts.

New this year, freshman (and sophomore) students will have the opportunity to participate in the "Hamilton Healthcare Showcase". At the showcase, students will earn CPR certification, have hands-on opportunities provided by the Careerline Tech Center staff, and have the opportunity to interact with healthcare professionals to learn more about their career, working hours, education, etc.

While Lynch is the student taking the lead on the extracurricular opportunity, he also wants to involve his classmates to help grow the student broadcasts.



"My goal with this is to have somebody new commentating with me every week. I want to get the student body involved in this, it's pretty cool," Lynch said. "It's not every day you get to live stream a game but at the same time I want it to be professional, unbiased, and we want to give both teams the same amount of professionalism."

Lynch is a student in Mr. Behnke's Covering Hawkeye Sports (CHS) class and that has helped get him prepared for the season and will continue to benefit him down the road.

"I have given thought to doing this, both this winter and potentially as a career," he added, "I think CHS will help me develop a thought of is this something I want to do or something I want to try as a career,"

Hamilton Athletics has live streamed games in the gymnasium and at the football stadium since 2020 but has not had any play-by-play or broadcast over it. Lynch is excited about that change.

"It's an added element," added Lynch, "You have someone there for you to explain what is happening if you don't know as much about basketball. We'll also be using graphics on the screen and showing people what the stats for the game are."

It's a chance for Lynch to use his passion and develop it into a potential career while also gaining the interest of his fellow classmates for seasons to come. Games will be broadcast live and also archived on the channel.

"I hope people tune in every home game and say, 'Hey, Hamilton Basketball, this is something that I'm interested in and a cool thing that the school and community are doing."

The students are in charge of all the apparel designs, ordering merchandise, updating inventory, and all of the day-to-day decisions to run a successful retail store.
